



These demographic shifts have increased challenges in the labor market due to an increasing variety of workers who differ by sex, race, age, sexual orientation, disability status, and immigrant status.










Paragraph structure

Paragraph structure is taught explicitly in US high schools using a series of mnemonics.


A mnemonic is an easy way to remember something; for example, the acronym 'FANBOYS' is a way to remember the most common coordinating conjunctions.
