External causes include the actions of specific people (such as coworkers, supervisors, family or friends) or events such as traffic jams, canceled events, or a spilled cup of coffee. The degree of anger is not always proportional to the severity of the event. Anger can also come from internal causes such as worrying or brooding about personal problems, memories of traumatic events, or feeling inadequate. While anger is a natural, adaptive response to external threats inspiring powerful, often aggressive, feelings and behaviours which allow us to fight and to defend ourselves when attacked, it is more difficult to see the value of internally-caused anger and self-hatred can have long-term negative effects.









The paragraph actually includes






If you paraphrase, you do not need to cite and reference








If there are three authors, you must write all three names in the citation








If you have a reference, you do not need a citation








If you cite the same source, you only need one reference








If the same authors have written two articles and you cite them both, you need two references








If the information came from the internet, you do not need a citation








If there are four or more authors, you can use 'et al.' instead of writing all the names.
