This essay has demonstrated the overall positive role of immigration in society. With large-scale immigration, business innovation is substantial and tax revenues increase. Although immigrants face initial prejudice and resentment, with full assimilation locals and immigrants develop respect for each other and for other foreigners, reducing the overall level of prejudice. It is, however, necessary to help immigrants assimilate quickly. A common solution is education and training programmes. These, however, often cause resentment when only available to immigrants (Knott-Fair, 2020). It is therefore recommended that all such programmes also be available for local citizens. This would help improve assimilation and reduce social tensions.




Reference Lists: answers

- One or many citations <-> each reference
- Harvard (a.k.a. 'Author Date')





Virus transmission can be reduced by the frequent washing of hands, the use of face masks, and the isolation of infected individuals. These *methods*, however, are not completely effective.






In this paragraph, which word is like 'methods'?

The periosteum contains blood vessels, nerves, and lymphatic vessels that nourish compact bone. The periosteum covers the entire outer surface except where the epiphyses meet other bones to form joints. In this region, the epiphyses are covered with articular cartilage, a thin layer of cartilage that reduces friction and acts as a shock absorber.






What are the defining features of metamorphic rocks? Don't use a dictionary.

These rocks have changed in the very hot and highpressure conditions deep inside the Earth's crust, where
rock created by deposition (sedimentary rocks) and
rock created by flows of lava from volcanoes (igneous
rocks) can be changed into *metamorphic* rock. In
certain conditions these rocks cool and crystallize
usually into bands of crystals.
